## Systematic Theology 502D

Fall Term 2023 5 SEPTEMBER–20 OCTOBER

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### COURSE DESCRIPTION

The second in a two-course sequence of Christian doctrine from the Anglican perspective (i.e., Soteriology, Anthropology, Ecclesiology, the Sacraments, and the Last Things). This course will examine the major Christian doctrines from their biblical foundations through their historical developments to their modern expressions. Particular attention will be given to how Anglicans have understood and received these doctrines and their importance in the life of the Church.

#### COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students will learn to think theologically from an Anglican perspective about life, the world, and ministry through the classical discipline of Systematic Theology. They will gain a familiarity with the sources of Christian theology, understand its methodology of faith seeking understanding (*fides quaerens intellectum*), recognize its theological terms and language, and comprehend how theological reasoning is at the heart of Christian ministry. Students will be able to identify and define major theological terms, explain the doctrines of Soteriology, Anthropology, Ecclesiology, the Sacraments, and the Last Things, analyze how Anglicans have received these doctrines, and compare and contrast uniquely Anglican teachings with both Protestantism and Roman Catholicism.

### COURSE REQUIREMENTS

The course grade will be based on one research paper 50%, online discussion 30%, and one final exam 20%. All assignments must be completed. Students are required to view and listen to the PowerPoint lectures. Online discussion will consist of one Required Post per week of 500 words (a page and a half at most) in response to the question for the week on the syllabus in light of the Leading Post. The Leading Post answering the question on the syllabus in light of the lectures and reading will be due Wednesday night, whereas the other Posts will be due Sunday night. Posts should include proper academic citation using parenthetical references and substantially engage the required reading and other appropriate sources. The final exam will be a closed book multiple-choice test over 50 theological terms found in McGrath and McKim. The research paper will be an in-depth examination of a major controversy, doctrine, or movement discussed in class proving a thesis statement. Since this paper is a large portion of your grade, it is expected that it will be a thorough and scholarly engagement of the subject in its historical context with appropriate use of primary and secondary source literature. The paper should be 12 pages in length and use footnotes. Grade Scale: A is excellent, B is good, C is satisfactory, D is poor, F is failing. Please follow the Chicago Manual of Style, i.e., Kate L.
